SUBJECT: Tax and Fee Modifications Included in the Budget

A number of legislators have requested information concerning tax and fee changes included in the 1995-97 biennial budget. This memorandum responds to those inquires.

Assembly Bill 150 includes a number of tax or fee increases, decreases or changes. In addition, some new fees are created while other, existing fees are eliminated. Table 1 provides a brief description of each of the tax and fee modifications proposed in AB 150. Specifically, the table contains a summary of each statutory modification which would cause tax or fee revenues to increase or decrease. Each entry in the table includes the agency name, the LFB summary document item that describes the change in more detail, a summary of the proposed modification and an estimate of the revenue change due to the tax or fee modification. Items with an extensive list of changes are more fully described in attachments to this memorandum.

In Table 1, GPR represents general fund revenue, including GPR-Earned amounts. Revenue to a program revenue account is signified by PR, SEG signifies revenue to a segregated fund and Unknown means that no estimate of the revenue impact is available at this time. The revenue amounts shown in the table reflect estimates made by the administration; estimates prepared by this office during budget deliberations may be different.

In a separate document, the Governor has also recently released his proposed transportation budget for 1995-97. Table 2 lists the fee changes proposed in the Governor's transportation budget. In Table 2, SEG signifies a revenue change to the transportation fund and Unknown means that no estimate of revenue impact is available at this time.

In summary, the changes included in AB 150 would increase taxes by \$59,600,000 (\$7,950,000 in 1995-96 and \$51,650,000 in 1996-97) and would increase fees by \$141,766,800 (\$58,754,600 in 1995-96 and \$83,012,200 in 1996-97). By fund source, the tax and fee changes

would provide an additional \$101,899,100 in general fund revenues, \$69,649,200 in program revenues and \$29,818,500 in segregated fund revenues. These totals do not include tax and fee modifications for which fiscal effects are not available.

The changes included in the Governor's recommended transportation budget would increase segregated fees by \$270,300,000 (\$113,500,000 in 1995-96 and \$156,800,000 in 1996-97).

The total of the net increased revenues in the 1995-97 biennium, as detailed in Tables 1 and 2, is shown by fund source below:
